This summer, the Olympic Games will be held in Beijing. The eyes of the world will be on China. There has already been a lot of controversy, and one of these has even touched the tradition of lighting the Olympic Flame. During the Ancient Olympic Games, a sacred flame was lit from **the sun's rays at Olympia. A lot of history has passed and the flame has come to symbolize "the light of spirit, knowledge, and life."** Originally, the torch was lit at Olympia in Greece and then carried by relay to the host-city of the games. 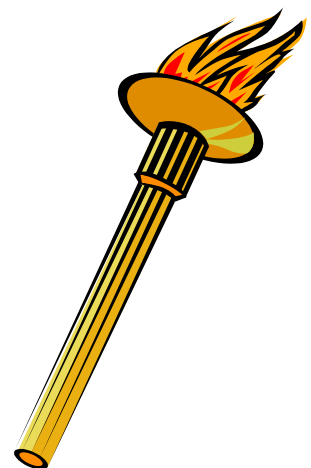
Like the Olympics, the eyes of our world are on our children.

Arcadia Invitational Track Meet. This year the Arcadia Invitational Track Meet will be held on Friday, April 11th and Saturday, April 12th. The Arcadia Invitational is one of the premiere high school track meets in the country, featured will be athletes from over twenty states as well as New Zealand, Australia and Canada. The meet begins on Friday evening and there are two sessions on Saturday, late morning to mid afternoon and late afternoon to the evening. Saturday evening will feature the best high school track athletes in the country, often times a high school record has been established during this session. All track fans will enjoy this event.

SENIORS

Points of interest for the last months of school:

April

Watch the mail for college acceptance and financial aid award letters. Compare the financial aid awards you receive from various colleges.

Check with the college you've chosen to attend about the details of signing and returning your financial aid award letter.

Watch for important deadlines at your chosen college (housing, financial aid, etc).

Make your final decision and send in a deposit by the deadline.

Notify the schools that you will not be attending of your final decision.

May

Advanced Placement (AP) exams are given in high schools nationwide. Make sure to send your AP grade report to your college.

If you have not received a notice regarding your Cal Grant application from the CA Student Aid Commission, contact them at 1-888-CAGrant as soon as possible.

May 1 is usually the deadline for notifying colleges of your decision.

Submit on-campus college housing forms and payment.

June/July

Submit request for your final transcript to be sent from the AHS Records Office to the college you will be attending in the fall (as

well as to the NCAA Clearinghouse for Div I or Div II athletes).

PARENTS: Don't forget to take your child to the doctor for a complete physical and immunizations.

Senioritis

This dreaded disease strikes suddenly at this time each year. The pressure to succumb is great, as antsy seniors find it far more attractive to spend time away from the campus than sitting in a classroom. You, as parents, need to watch for the signs! They include the following justifications: "Attendance is not necessary to pass my classes." "It doesn't really matter because I don't need my classes for graduation." "It's senior ditch day...again." Be forewarned, these excuses don't hold water!

Attendance is critical during the second semester of the senior year. **All students are expected to attend regularly.** Good attendance contributes directly to good grades. Poor attendance can result in missed assignments, missed exams, and poor grades. Most students need to pass every class in order to graduate, and **MUST** pass the state mandated English and Government/Economics courses. **Also, seniors who are already 18 years of age may be involuntarily transferred to an alternate educational setting for poor attendance.**

Admissions offices of four-year colleges expect seniors to maintain their GPA. D's and F's in required college prep courses make students ineligible for admission. A significant lowering of GPA may re-

sult in colleges rescinding a previous offer of acceptance and dropping students from their rolls. Don't be fooled by the "it doesn't count" excuse. It does.

Please help your student stay focused and finish strong. The single most important factor for a student's academic success is parent support.

For Juniors Only

All juniors who anticipate needing a letter of recommendation for a private college or scholarship next

year should begin filling out their Student Data Packet as soon as possible.

This will soon be available on the Counseling Website:

The Student Data Packet should be downloaded, filled out legibly, then turned in to the Career Center after you have made a copy to keep for yourself. The deadline for submitting the Student Data Packet is **September 26, 2008**. The Student Data Packet needs to be completed by all juniors who will be applying to private colleges and/or for scholarships during the senior year.

Additional Funding for School Counselors Grades 7-12

Last year, the State of California allotted additional funding for Supplemental High School and Middle School Counseling programs for grades 7-12. With these funds, AUSD was able to hire more counselors in order to provide supplementary support programs and services for our students. Counselors now meet with all students, grades 7-12, for an annual review of their progress toward high school graduation, college admission and future career goals and options.

In addition, counselors meet with all students (and their parents) who have not passed required courses or have not passed one or both parts of the California High School Exit Exam, the swim proficiency, health proficiency or Algebra 1 proficiency. These meetings provide time to develop individual student plans, which will ensure success in school, and one which parents can support and monitor as well.

This funding has provided for two counselors at each grade level, thus lowering the counselor-to-student ratio and allowing for more one-on-one time for students, parents and counselors. Also, two counselors work solely with English

Language Learners and with those students in special programs who need extra support and services. Finally, a full-time college and career counselor is available in the Career Center each day. This counselor has already started several new programs connecting students to college information, college representatives, NCAA speakers and financial aid programs.

Last year, phase 1 of the Middle and High School Supplemental Program began with the development of the Bridge Counseling Program, allowing for a counselor at each middle school in the district to spend two days a week at the high school working with 9th grade students. These "Bridge" counselors spend three days a week at their respective middle schools and help with the transition and orientation process of 8th grade students through their first year of high school.

Please note the attached summer class schedule. Enrollment will begin at lunch on Monday, March 17th in the Career Center/ROP office A-3; classes are **FREE** to high school students. Space is limited and because of high demand, enrollment is based on a first come first serve basis. Gain a valuable skill and earn some credits towards graduation at the same time.

Something to consider in finding your career:

Get a job or do some volunteer work in your community. A part-time job can teach you many valuable skills you will later need in a career. It can teach you to be dependable, improve your ability to get along with others. Having a job requires you to plan your free time between study and fun and teaches you how to budget your money. The Career Center/ROP office has a volunteer book that consists of non-paid opportunities for students in many private and public agencies throughout the San Gabriel Valley. We also have a job book, which is updated with posted employment opportunities from the local community business professionals.
